

A Little History.....

Elizabeth Pye Haines (Betty) was born May 26th, 1920 to Alfred W. and Mable Johnston Pye in Alameda, California. She joined siblings, David, age 9 and Margaret, age 7 in an idyllic childhood on a park and beach where she learned to swim, dive, play tennis and sail. In the age of the automobile, the family vacationed on the Russian River and Lake Tahoe. Betty learned to ride horses and ski.



The family moved across the bay where Betty was a transfer student to Piedmont High School in 1936. She pledged Delta Gamma Sorority at the University of California Berkeley and commuted to campus from home. She studied bacteriology. After graduation, during WWII, she worked for a Navy doctor as his secretary, a profession encouraged by her mother who was one of the first female secretaries in Chicago at the turn of the century. Her mother had met Al in the Chicago Eastman Kodak office. The San Francisco Earthquake and Great Fire figured prominently in her parent's early marriage, as Al had been transferred there in the spring of 1906.

Betty met her husband, Byron D. Haines on a blind date at the Claremont Hotel in Piedmont, arranged by a mutual friend in the fall of 1943. They were married a few months later on November 13 at her parent's home. Byron was a Naval lieutenant training Navy pilots in physical education at San Luis Obispo military base, where they first lived. Their first child, Sally Margaret, was born in Oakland while By was being shipped out to sea to fight in the Pacific in 1944 and Betty lived with her parents.

After the war, they moved to West Seattle. By sold life insurance and daughter Laurie was born in 1947. In 1949 they moved to Sumner, where William D. (Bill) was born in 1953. By commuted to Carbonado and Buckley to start Timberline Lumber Co during the 1950s. In 1961, the family moved to Zenith, now Des Moines. Betty was back on the water and soon after acquired the Haida 26, called the "Shady Lady", that she maintained into her nineties. While an avid sailor in the summers, she skied in the winters until hip replacement sidelined her at age eighty. She was truly a lifelong athlete.

In February 2020, the Haines family began planning a celebration of Betty in honor of her 100^{th} birthday. Due to the pandemic, the party was cancelled. So this announcement is now a celebration of achievement. Betty would love to hear from you in a phone call or card anytime during the month of May. Those of you who attended our February social and heard about Barb Headley and Nick Malden's two-year Great Loop cruise may remember that they were on their way to Florida to pick up their new boat and head to the Bahamas. Earlier this month, I heard from Barb, who reported that they had hunkered down in the Bahamas on varying and increasingly strict lockdowns before heading to a marina near Nassau where they took on fuel and water and waited for a weather window to make a run back to the States.



She says they "zoomed out under cover of darkness at 5 AM and did the 220 miles in one day, arriving to an anchorage just south of Miami at dusk. Long day but the water and passage were perfect until the last 90 minutes and even that was acceptable. We are now limping in on one engine northward to take our boat to store it in hurricane safe spot in the middle of Florida off Lake Okeechobee." They are postponing plans for cruising in New England and Canada and were planning to rent a van to travel back to Tacoma.

Racing News Dean Conti, Race Fleet Captain Duane Rubash, Assistant Race Fleet Captain

With the continuation of the Covid-19 outbreak and the resulting distancing rules, TTPYC has decided to cancel the Late Spring Race Series that had been scheduled to start next Thursday, May 7^{th} . This follows an almost universal worldwide halt of racing at all levels.



The most recently posted information available from the State has Puget Sound set to open up for local fishing next Tuesday, May 5^{th} . Their desire is that people will not travel far from their homes nor gather in large groups. Unfortunately, social distancing is still necessary. In our minds it matters little if you are fishing or just traveling around in your boat without docking anywhere except back in your slip.

The Club trustees have been looking for a way to encourage members to get safely out on their boats to make up for the lost cruising and racing opportunities. What we are proposing is a simplified Predicted Log Regatta to take the place of the Late Spring Series. This can include all powerboats and sailboats. At the same time, it will also act as a fundraiser for the Des Moines Food Bank.

You first have to decide if your immediate family and friends that you have been isolating with can safely handle your boat. We're thinking 2-4 people per boat. The goal is to accurately predict the time it will take for you to travel a set course while only using your depth sounder, speedometer and paper charts.

Here is the course for next Thursday, May 7th:

This graph lists the starting point and the magnetic bearing and distance to the next mark. Easy right, just go 5.8nm/hr and it will

take exactly one hour. However, there are variables to consider. Wind, current,

unexpected obstructions (logs, kelp, freighters), the size and speed of your turning radii and any number of other things that can affect speed and distance. Again, while running the course, the helmsman can only use the depth sounder, speedometer and paper charts (which I'm sure you have on your boat). That person can have NO access to any timing device. They have to decide on the fly if they need to adjust their boat speed to correct for any of the outside variables. And no helpful suggestions from the peanut gallery!

To make it even more challenging you have to predict your elapsed time for each leg individually. As an example, for the above course, running at 5.8 knots with no wind, no current, zero turning radii, no obstructions and no extra distance while travelling at a perfectly constant speed:

Leg 1 - 7 minutes, 14 seconds

Leg 2 - 22 minutes, 45 seconds

Leg 3 - 21 minutes, 43 seconds

Leg 4 - 4 minutes, 9 seconds

Leg 5 - 4 minutes, 9 seconds

Total - 60 minutes

This certainly can be attempted while sailing though the variables become much larger and harder to predict. But since the primary goal is to just get out on the water with fellow boaters that are experiencing cabin fever, what the heck.

The time keeper on each boat needs to record the actual time as the boat comes adjacent to each mark, start through finish. Since we are only interested in elapsed time it makes no difference if your time piece is not synchronized to GMT or what time you start. Our plan is to have Equus anchored off K mark no later than 6PM to answer any questions. Spend some time thinking about your boat performance, study the current charts and what your actual distance travelled might be. Select what speed you want to run at and calculate away.

Equus will also be accepting donations for the Des Moines Food Bank. There is no registration or fee associated with this event so please be generous. To maintain safe separation, we'll hang a bucket off the spinnaker pole for you to deposit donations and to collect the completed timing forms after you finish the course.

Depending on participation, we plan on running this all five Thursday evenings of the Late Spring Series.
